### The Acorn Catalog and WorldCat - Subjects and Call Numbers

For some research, you will want to find out broadly what has been published on a specific area of study. For monographic treatments of an area of interest, Vanderbilt's [Acorn](#) and OCLC's [WorldCat](#) are the best places to start. (Acorn tells you what the Vanderbilt libraries own and WorldCat tells you what libraries around the world own.) Search WorldCat similarly to the way you search Acorn to generate a list of titles under a particular subject heading.

Standardized subject headings and call numbers are assigned to books and other material added to the library collection to describe and organize the intellectual content. Approaching a subject through the analytical logic of the catalog provides an efficient path to relevant material.

Example: Select a standard work from one of the reference tools above and search the title in Acorn.

“History of Marriage” is not a subject heading used by our library or by most of the libraries in the United States. Examples of subject headings used for works in this area are:

Marriage – History – Sources

Marriage (Jewish law)

Marriage – Moral and Ethical aspects – Catholic Church – History

Marriage – Religious aspects – Christianity

Marriage service – Liturgy – Texts

Family – United States – Religious life

Sex role – United States – History

More specific topics will have subject headings to reflect the specificity. A strategy for finding appropriate headings is to use an assigned text or search the topic in the reference tools below and select a highly recommended source from the bibliography on the topic. Search the title in Acorn. The record's subject headings are hyperlinked to other titles with the same subject headings. This type of searching is helpful for finding both primary and secondary sources related to your topic.

There are two approaches to searching for primary sources in the catalog: (1) Select the advanced search option. Search by several subjects of interest, including “Sources” as one of the subjects searched. (2) Add “Sources” to any subject string (e.g., Marriage – England – History – To 1500 – Sources) when doing a basic search by subject. In addition to searching for “Sources,” you may also want to consider using “Case Studies,” “Sermons,” “Handbooks, manuals, etc.” or “Popular works” depending on your area of interest.

The call number is another lead to related works and can be searched by browsing the shelves in reference or the stacks as well as an online call number search that allows you to browse books that are checked out or stored at the Annex. Call numbers for the History of Marriage can be found in HQ (Family, Marriage, and Women), BL (Religion), BM (Judaism), BP (Islam), BQ (Buddhism), BR (Christianity), BT (Doctrinal Theology), BV (Practical Theology), BX (Christian Denominations), CB (History of Civilization), and KB (Religious Law).

Examples of call numbers are:

HQ1051 (described as general works on the church and marriage)

BV835 (described as the sacrament of marriage)

BX8349 (described as Methodist doctrines)

More specific subjects will have their own call numbers. A cautionary note: books with more than one subject can only be located in one place so may not be placed on the shelves beside other books on the topic.

### Databases for Finding Articles, Book Chapters, and Primary Sources

The following databases are most useful for historical studies in religion.

[ATLA Religion Database](#) This compiles bibliographic information on publications (books, articles, book reviews) related to religious studies. It includes the journal *Theology & Sexuality*.

[JSTOR](#) This is a database with many full-text historical resources online (though some are also accessible through ATLA). It contains the *Journal of Marriage and the Family* (to 2001) and *Marriage and Family Living*.

[Proquest](#) This database searches a wide array of journals, newspapers and magazines. Please note that Proquest offers several different searching options/databases which cannot all be selected simultaneously (e.g., certain historical newspapers much be searched separately). It contains the *Journal*

*of Marriage and the Family* (from 1988), *Marriage & Family Review*, and *Journal of the History of Sexuality*.

[SpringerLINK](#) This database contains hundreds of journals related to the humanities and social sciences, including the *International Journal of Sexuality and Gender Studies*.

Depending on your time period and focus, the following databases may also be helpful in finding primary and secondary sources related to the history of marriage. You may also want to browse through the listing of [Religion-related Databases](#) on the Divinity library website for additional relevant databases.

[America: History and Life](#) and [Historical Abstracts](#) These databases together contain 100,000+ journal articles. You can search U.S. and Canadian history and culture (*America: History and Life*), the rest of the world exclusive of the U.S. and Canada (*Historical Abstracts*), or both together. It also includes abstracts for some dissertations.

[American Memory](#) This database is maintained by the Library of Congress and includes access to many primary sources, including recordings (sound and visual).

[Diotima](#) This site collects online resources for the study of women in antiquity. It focuses on classical (Greek and Roman) antiquity, but also includes items related to ANE and biblical studies.

[Early English Books Online](#) This database contains primary source materials in English from the 15<sup>th</sup> to early 18<sup>th</sup> centuries.

[Family in Society](#) This is an online text with primary source documents related to the family, including marriage. (After selecting the above link, choose the Web Link on the resulting Acorn record.)

[Feminae](#) This database contains materials related to women, sexuality and gender in the Middle Ages.

[Gender Inn](#) This database contains materials related to feminist theory and feminist literary criticism.

[Gender Issues and Sexuality](#) This online text provides approximately 175 primary sources about gender issues from the 19<sup>th</sup> through the 21<sup>st</sup> centuries. (After selecting the above link, choose the Web Link on the resulting Acorn record.)

[Gender Studies Database](#) This database combines several other databases and specifically contains citations and some full-text gender-related articles.

[Historic Documents](#) This database contains primary sources (~2500) since 1972.

[In the First Person](#) This database contains over 4000 international oral history sources (in English).

[Index of Christian Art](#) This database contains medieval art with full text records for nearly 9000 works of art dating from early apostolic times to 1400 A.D.

[IngentaConnect](#) This database contains almost 24 million searchable journal articles. Many are full-text.

[LexisNexis® Academic](#) This database holds a variety of source types (e.g., newspapers and magazines) for contemporary information. It includes the journal *Cohabitation, Marriage, Divorce, and Remarriage in the United States*.

[Making of America](#) This site contains primary sources from 19<sup>th</sup> century America.

[MECAS](#) This database contains historical articles related to the countries and peoples of the Middle East, Central Asia and North Africa.

[Mormon Studies CD-ROM](#) This is a large collection of previously-published materials related to Mormon studies. Available only in the library.

[19th Century Masterfile](#) This database contains primary source materials from 19<sup>th</sup> century periodicals, newspapers and government records.

[Project Muse](#) This database contains articles from the arts, humanities and social sciences.

[RAMBI](#) This database contains articles related to Jewish studies.

[Religion and Philosophy Database](#) Allows users to search almost 1,000,000 articles by keyword. Most usefully, it also contains searchable subject guides.

[Sociological Abstracts](#) This database contains abstracts of sociology-related journal articles, dissertations and conference papers.

[WASM](#) This database contains primary documents related to women and social movements in the United States from the 17<sup>th</sup> century to the present.
